The pilgrims were tasked with picking up something from our visit, a pebble, a piece of driftwood, a flower, leaf or feather and to bring this back to place before our Pilgrimage candle which each day had a new 'colour' material added to the display to represent the sky, the land, the sea etc.

Our last night was in Durham, Fr. Tony of St. Cuthberts Parish made us feel so welcome by inviting the group for tea/coffee after morning Mass. We had a wonderful tour of Durham Cathedral & lunch in Bishops Priory before our journey home to Flitwick.



We had beautiful singing from Beth Hutton (Shefford Parish) & David Cheshire (Dunstable) during the long coach journey with historical information on the towns & cities we went through. Music quizzes and stories and jokes broke up the journey. Most of the Pilgrims had a part to play in the daily services and we returned strengthened & renewed in our faith, we found 'peace' on Iona, we supported each other with love and prayers, forming new friendships that will last well beyond this pilgrimage.
