The Distinguishing Marks of Lent – Prayer

Tradition tells us that Lent has three distinguishing marks: prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

Prayer is the best place to begin, because it is the one that unites them all. Fasting and almsgiving are themselves just forms of prayer.

There are two classic definitions of prayer. The one in most catechisms comes from St John of Damascus (eighth century): 'Prayer is the raising of the mind and heart to God.' The other comes from St Clement of Alexandria (third century), who defined prayer as 'conversation with God'.

In prayer we talk to God, and he talks to us. As in any relationship, this conversation takes many forms. Think of all the ways a husband and wife communicate: formal marriage vows, casual chat, winks across a crowded room, affectionate caresses, and phrases they never tire of repeating.

Our communication with God includes a similar range of expressions, set phrases, quiet conversation, gestures such as the Sign of the Cross, and the intimate embrace of the sacraments. Just as a man and woman grow in love by repeating 'I love you', so we Christians grow in love by repeating the Church's prayers.

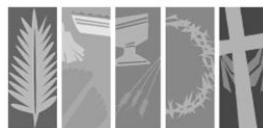
Prayer comes in many forms and styles, usually divided into 'vocal' and 'mental' prayer. The categories are helpful, but not watertight. All prayer, after all, should involve our mind; so, in a sense, all prayer is mental prayer. Modern writers sometimes speak of the two types as formal prayer and spontaneous prayer. Again, such distinctions are useful; we should, however, step beyond them for a moment. When we look at all prayer as conversation, it can change the way we go about it. Thinking of prayer as conversation can help us also to overcome obstacles, such as distractions, inability to focus, because all these things also come up in human conversation.

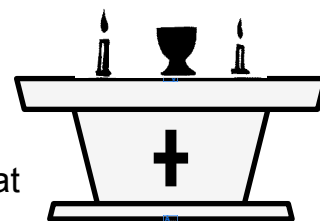

OUR LENTEN CONVERSATION 'OUR PARTICIPATION IN THE MASS' ABOUT SESSION 1 – THE HISTORY OF THE MASS AND THE SETTING FOR MASS

Each week we are extending the Lenten conversation 'Our Participation in the Mass' to everyone in the parish through this short summary of the session. There are questions to ponder in the week ahead, in order that everyone can grow in their appreciation of the jewel of the church – the Mass. Why not join us in person on Tuesday!

Jesus instituted the Eucharist, the core of the Mass, in the celebration of the Last Supper. Over the centuries the Mass and its Missal have evolved out of many traditions of the celebration of the Eucharist to give us the sacrament we experience today. Our weekly gathering is rightly called the 'source and summit' of our faith.



As we look towards the sanctuary, the sacred space where the Mass is celebrated, we see two 'tables'. One is obviously a table, the altar at which the priest and deacon serve; the other is the lectern, the 'table'

from which Word is announced by the readers, the deacon and the priest. Here, just as the priest will break the bread on the altar, the preacher 'breaks the Word' to enable us to relate the scriptures to our daily life.



These two tables enable us to recognise our role in participating in the Mass. This is made up of gathering, listening, responding and then going forth, better able to engage with the world as Christians, which means co-workers with Jesus Christ. Participation is not just active – like having a role like a server, collector, welcome or minister – it is also relies on us being aware of the Mass. Its stages and our opportunity to be alive to the way we can respond to each step in the 'dance' that is the Mass.

Here are some questions to ponder this week.

- † *Remember a celebration of the Mass when you felt fully engaged; what was different for you that day?*
- † *In what ways or stages am I really taking part in the Mass?*
- † *What do I expect of the Mass?*
