



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The Distinguishing Marks of Lent – Almsgiving

Of the three marks of Lent prayer, fasting and almsgiving, almsgiving is surely the most neglected. And yet, in the only place where the Bible brings all three together, the inspired author puts the emphasis firmly on the last: 'Prayer and fasting are good, but better than either is almsgiving accompanied by righteousness ... Those who regularly give alms shall enjoy a full life' (Tobias 12:8-9).

Why is almsgiving better than prayer and fasting? Because it is prayer, and it involves fasting. Almsgiving is a form of prayer because it is 'giving to God' and not mere philanthropy. It is a form of fasting because it demands sacrificial giving not just giving something, but giving up something, giving till it hurts.

Jesus presented almsgiving as a necessary part of Christian life: 'When you give alms, sound no trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may be praised by men. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing' (Matthew 6:2-3). He does not say IF you give alms, but WHEN. Like fasting and prayer, almsgiving is non-negotiable.

That was the living embodiment of a basic principle of Catholic social teaching, what tradition calls the universal destination of goods. *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* puts it succinctly: 'The goods of creation are destined for the entire human race' (n. 2452). But they cannot get there unless we put them there and that requires effort.

As with prayer and fasting, so with almsgiving. If we have a plan, we will find it easier to do. Throughout history, many Christians have used the Old Testament practice of tithing as a guide, that is, they give a tenth of their income to God. In practice, that means giving it to the poor, to the parish, or to charitable institutions.

OUR LENTEN CONVERSATION 'OUR PARTICIPATION IN THE MASS' ABOUT SESSION 3 – WORD

Each week we are extending the Lenten conversation 'Our Participation in the Mass' to everyone in the parish through this short summary of the session. There are questions to ponder in the week ahead in order that everyone can grow in their appreciation of the jewel of the church – the Mass. Why not join us in person on Tuesday!



When we refer to the Word within the Mass we are describing the time around the first 'table' of the Mass. The lectern is the focus for what is around half of the time we spend together at Mass, a time where all we hear and recite is inspired through the Holy Spirit and is great part of the words, teaching, stories and parables that were proclaimed by Jesus himself and honoured in the words of the New Testament letters of Paul, Peter, John and others.

We are urged to 'listen' to the Word – a major challenge as many like to read along with the text, yet Jesus himself asks us to listen. His call is not simply to listen with our ears, but to invest our whole being in 'listening' – with our mind, heart and soul. It is in this way that we can be active and conscious in our participation with the Word.

The whole package of the Word begins with the wisdom of the Old Testament, followed by the chant of the psalm and the letters and gospel. We break these words in the homily that the priest or deacon prepares with the help of prayer and reflection. We are not done with the Word even at this point. For as a community, we stand to express our solidarity with all that is taught by the Church in the words of the creed; this title derives from the Latin credo – I believe.

We spoke in the piece on 'gathering' about Jesus words 'when two or three come together in my name, there I am in your midst'. Jesus tells us all 'to ask for what you want, and you will get it'; thus we conclude our expression of the Word with our collective prayers, the 'prayers of the faithful'. These are prayers that reflect the needs and concerns of the community, and require our personal commitment to pray these prayers not only at Mass, but throughout the week ahead.

Here are some questions to ponder this week.

- † *In what way is the passage of scripture relevant as Good News for the world today?*
- † *What qualities should we be looking for, as people who listen to the Word?*
- † *In what ways does the community respond to the word we proclaim and what more might we be able to do in the world outside our four walls?*
