

23 April – Feast of St George

Pictures of St George usually show him killing a dragon to rescue a beautiful lady. The dragon stands for wickedness; the lady stands for God's holy truth. St George was a brave martyr who was victorious over the devil.

He was a soldier in the army of the Roman Emperor Diocletian, and he was one of the emperor's favourites. Diocletian was a pagan and a bitter enemy to the Christians; he put to death every Christian he could find. George was a brave Christian, a real soldier of Christ. Without fear, he went to the emperor and scolded him for being so cruel. Then he gave up his position in the Roman army, for which he was tortured in many terrible ways and finally beheaded.



So boldly daring and so cheerful was St George in declaring his faith and in dying for it, that Christians felt courage when they heard about it. Many songs and poems were written about this martyr.

We all have some dragon we have to conquer. It might be pride, or anger, or laziness, or greed, or something else. Let us make sure we fight against these dragons with God's help. Then we can call ourselves real soldiers of Christ. .

Fr. Denis writes ...

David Cairns, a young British politician, who sadly died in 2011, was on a trip to Israel, and travelled to see the famous Sea of Galilee. Standing on the site of the Sermon on the Mount, David spread his arms out and recited the Beatitudes of Jesus.



David stood in the very place where Jesus stood, and said the very things that Jesus said. Like all followers of Jesus, David attempted to follow the example of his Lord. Back home in Britain, David tried to practise those Beatitudes in the busy world of national and international politics. Christian socialism was his life.

In the days of the early Church, internal troubles arose over matters of social equality. As the Church grew, the need for organisation and administration grew as well. When those who were poor were being neglected, complaints were made. A meeting was called, the complaints were voiced, and a resolution was found. The Gospel was put into practice.

Those first disciples of Jesus had been through their training. They followed a Lord who had told them not to be afraid. They remembered the time of the storm on the lake, when the Lord came to them. They had endured the cross, and now knew the



resurrection. External persecution, internal politics, were all the same to them. The Lord who preached the Beatitudes by the Sea of Galilee was with them. We today have

the same calling: preaching the Gospel to the world and practising justice within the Church remains the agenda.

21 April – Feast of St Anselm (1033–1109)

He was born in Aosta, in northern Italy, and became a monk of Bec in Normandy where he taught theology and devoted himself to the spiritual life. After some years as abbot, he succeeded his master, Lanfranc, as archbishop of Canterbury. His bitter disputes with the kings of England over the independence of the Church resulted in his twice being exiled. He died at Canterbury on 21 April 1109. He is remembered for his theological learning and writings, and for organising and reforming Church life in England.
