A Reflection by Fr. Denis

What attracted the social outcasts to John the Baptist was not so much what he said, as the fact that someone was speaking to them all. So they had at least the possibility to repent. The people who will not repent are those who do not even consider the possibility of repentance. Perhaps the shock of the crucifixion may have woken some priests up to their real need for repentance. In the Acts of the Apostles, we are told that many priests became obedient to the faith. Their part in the death of Christ opened them up to the reality of their own sins, and the resurrection of Christ showed them the possibility of redemption.

Fr. Denis writes ...

All of us can look back at lost opportunities in life. We realise that we have taken the wrong fork in the road and have paid the price. In His journey from Galilee to Jerusalem, Jesus was constantly surrounded by crowds, and again and again He pleaded with them to seize the opportunity offered by His mission and teaching. They were living in challenging times. In Him, God was visiting His people.

Jesus employed many images and stories in His teaching. He uses three images, two of them designed to promote urgency of response and one likely to produce pleasant surprise and encouragement. The first is that

of a narrow door, which many would not be able to pass through. The second is that of a locked door, which the owner of the house would refuse to open to

latecomers, despite their desperate pleadings. The third is that of a crowded banquet, thronged not only with the great and the good of Israel's history but also with joyous people from the four corners of the earth.

With such images Jesus urged the crowds to respond to God's invitation. We know from elsewhere in the gospels that Jesus had pity on the crowds because they were like sheep without a shepherd. When He sent out the seventy on their mission, it was because the harvest was plentiful but the labourers few. May we not miss the opportunities the Lord gives to us respond to the invitations God gives us.

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4 October – Feast of St Francis of Assisi (1181-1226)

Francis was the son of a prosperous cloth merchant in Assisi. When his father objected to having his goods sold without his consent to pay for the restoration of a church, the bishop commanded Francis to repay the money. He did. He also renounced his father and gave back everything he had ever been given, even his garments. He began a life of perfect evangelical poverty, living by begging and even then only accepting the worst food that people had to give. He preached to all the love of God and the love of the created world; because, having renounced everything, he celebrated everything he received, or saw, or heard, as a gift. A rich man sold everything and joined him in living next to a leper colony; a canon from a neighbouring church gave up his position and joined them also. They looked into the gospel and saw the story of the rich young man whom Jesus told to sell everything; they saw Jesus telling his disciples to take nothing with them on their journey; they saw Jesus saying that his followers must also carry his cross. And on that basis they founded an order. Francis himself went to Rome and persuaded the Pope to sanction it, though it must have seemed at once impractical and subversive, to set thousands of holy men wandering penniless round the towns and villages of Europe.



Because Francis was wearing an old brown garment begged from a peasant, tied round the middle with string, that became the Franciscan habit. Ten years later 5,000 men were wearing it; a hundred years later Dante was buried in it because it was more glorious than cloth of gold.

There is too much to say about Francis to fit here. He tried to convert the Muslims, or at least to attain martyrdom in doing so. He started the practice of setting up a crib in church to celebrate the Nativity.

Francis died in 1226, having started a revolution. The Franciscans endure to this day.
