DIOCESAN YEAR OF PRAYER AND VOCATION

Bishop Peter declared 2018 as a Diocesan Year of Prayer and Vocation, with a suggested theme for each month for prayer focused on our Catholic and Christian vocation. With this as a guide, we created a parish programme that help people to experience a wider range of types of prayer.

One of the most fruitful of these occasions was the sessions of quiet meditative prayer, which remained the most popular of the events staged. Evenings of Taizé prayer saw Fr. John leading the chants and songs which originated from this centre of spirituality in France, with his guitar. This is an ecumenical style of prayer.

Two other significant events were firstly, the 24 Hours for the Lord, held on 9 and 10 March. Secondly, in September, were the three days of exposition and Holy Hour to coincide with the National Eucharistic Congress in Liverpool. A group of five people and Deacon Philip attended the event.

In October, traditionally the month of the rosary, the Pastoral Area Council staged a Day for Mary. This focused on the gift of the rosary as a source of meditation and devotion. Well supported it led to a renewal of the commitment of the parish to offer opportunities to pray the rosary.

During the year, Pope Francis called a world meeting of families in Dublin in August. The families Burgess and the Traynor- Bucknell attended.

REPORT ON JUST ONE HOUSE

We launched our project in June 2018 with the aim of raising £3,600 in support of Refugees Welcome Milton Keynes (RWMK), to enable a house to be fitted out for another refugee family from Syria. This was in response to the appeal from Pope Francis for every parish in Europe to support one family.

Our year-long fundraising activities have included a sponsored walk, a summer brunch, a special collection, St Patrick's celebration, a pledging system, and individual donations. I am very pleased to report that, thanks to the generosity of the parish, we will by June 2019 have collected a total of at least £4,600.

We will be joined after Mass on Sunday 30 June by Marie Gracie, the inspiration behind Just One House, and we will be handing over a cheque for £3,500 for British Red Cross, who are responsible for fitting out the House, and a cheque for £1,100 for RWMK for their commitments to the families.

I would like to express my gratitude to the PPC and you the people of the parish for all your support.

THE FUTURE OF SACRED HEART IN RELATION TO CENTRAL BEDFORDSHIRE'S DEVELOPMENT PLANS

The Pastoral Area Council asked all the member churches to look to the future and think about the impact of the housing development in their area.

We looked at Central Bedfordshire plan for housing to 2035. The plan, called Pre-Submission, is for proposals from now to 2035. There are many significant developments currently under construction not accounted for – e.g. Ampthill South, Flitwick, Steppingley Road, Marston (Millennium Park).

Based on the Pre-Submission plan we have estimated that there will be 1,860 houses in seven different locations in the parish and 5,063 in Marston. Giving a total of 6,923.

There are numerous submissions marked on the plan where the council has not deliberated, so no verdict is available but if, say, 10% are accepted this would likely mean 2,000 more houses.

Based on current number of 6,923 taken solely from the Pre-Submission Plan a calculation of the potential impact on the parish was made.

The main assumptions are:

- 10% claim a Catholic history
- 2.5 people per household
- 10% of these, 1% of the new population are likely to be practising Catholics

- Therefore we can expect 175-200 new parishioners from the future developments in the Pre-Submission plan
- This compares with the overall parish population of 287 in 2014, 244 in 2016, 233 in 2017 and estimated 200 in 2018

Saturday afternoon the 15 September saw the first-ever thank you Mass for volunteers at Sacred Heart church. Upwards of 60 people who give unpaid work to the parish gathered for the service. Fr. John got over his message that volunteering is akin to love, therefore a truly Christian activity. He said that because of the fall in numbers of priests who used to do 'all the work', now the laity 'have to do more', and he ended by urging us, including himself, to 'Get stuck in together.'

After the Mass, people filled the parish room which offered a fine selection of finger food, cheese, biscuits, sweets for the kids (and for some voracious grown-ups), tea, coffee and wine. People chatted, while kitchen volunteers did their own bit for the volunteers. The service and socialising were well received; hopefully this will be a regular event.

Here are only some of the 199 jobs carried out by 113 volunteers, without whom the parish would be poorer in looks, operation and spirit: sacristan duty; cleaning; reading; collectors and counters; altar servers; Eucharistic ministers; organising/running book club, pilgrimage; SVP; DIY; councillors for the PAC and PPC; fundraising ... and much other unsung work.
