PARISH CATECHESIS FROM FR. JERRY

Theme: The faith of Peter was tested...Jesus said why do you doubt?

The Christian way of life is based on Reason and Faith. Since there is an irresistible desire for truth, only a harmonious relationship between faith and reason can show the correct path to God and to self-fulfilment.

The Gospel reading narrates a Faith journey of Peter towards Jesus on the sea. Rationally Peter as a fisherman may not be afraid of the sea water, 'but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and he began to sink', he needed supernatural strength, that is faith. One would think and expect that the disciples, having seen the demonstration of Jesus' power in the multiplication of loaves and fish, would have been confident that Jesus would surely save them from the fury of the storm. Unfortunately, they believed in their own fears and often had their doubts about Jesus Christ. The Church teaches that even though we are enlightened by Christ in whom we believe, faith is often lived in darkness and can be put to the test. The world we live in often seems very far from the one promised us by faith. Our experience of evil and suffering, injustice and death, seem to contradict the Good News. These situations shake our faith (CCC#164).

Although Jesus Christ is always with us, we sometimes think he is far away from us. He is with us to save us. In a most mysterious way, God the Father has revealed his almighty power in the voluntary humiliation and Resurrection of his Son, by which he conquered evil (CCC#272). Like the disciples, we tend to forget or misunderstand the significance of Jesus' power in our lives which makes us inclined to believe in our own fears than in the power and the promises of Jesus.

Jesus invites us to be focused on him alone and not on 'the strong winds of life' like our weakness, which will surely frighten us. Nothing is more apt to confirm our faith and hope than holding it fixed in our minds that nothing is impossible with God. Once our reason has grasped the idea of God's almighty power, it will quickly and without any hesitation admit everything that the CREED will afterwards propose for us to believe even if they are far above the ordinary laws of nature (CCC#274). When we seem to be overwhelmed by the storms of life such as frequent unexplained sadness, killing, climate change or panic, we are to call out to Jesus as Peter did! 'Lord, save me'. May we come to believe in Jesus Christ that he is closer to us than we can imagine.

There will be no children's liturgy in August. The last children's liturgy will take place on Sunday 30 July.


ST. MAXIMILIAN KOLBE—14 AUGUST

He was born on 8 January 1894 in occupied Poland: he joined the Franciscans in Lwów in 1910, and was ordained eight years later, as his country became free and independent for the first time in over 120 years. He believed that the world was passing through a time of intense spiritual crisis, and that Christians must fight for the world's salvation with all the means of modern communication. He founded a newspaper and a sodality called the Knights of Mary Immaculate, which spread widely both in Poland and abroad. In 1927 he founded a community, a 'city of Mary,' at Teresin: centred round the Franciscan friary, it attracted many lay people and became self-supporting, publishing many periodicals and running its own radio station.

In 1930 he went to Japan, studied Buddhism and Shintoism, and through the Japanese edition of his newspaper spread the Christian message in a way that was in harmony with Japanese culture. In Nagasaki, he set up a 'Garden of the Immaculate,' which survived

the atomic bomb. He also travelled to Malabar and to Moscow, but was recalled to Poland in 1936 for reasons of health. When the Germans invaded in 1939, the community at Teresin sheltered thousands of refugees, most of them Jews. In 1941 he was arrested and sent to the concentration camp at Auschwitz, where he helped and succoured the inmates. In August of that year a prisoner escaped and in reprisal the authorities were choosing ten people to die by starvation. One of the men had a family and Maximilian Kolbe offered to take his place. The offer was accepted and he spent his last days comforting his fellow prisoners. The man he saved was present at his canonisation.
