PARISH CATECHESIS FROM FR JERRY

The Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

Theme: For my eyes have seen the salvation prepared for all nations

The Feast of the Holy Family of Nazareth celebrates the obedience of Jesus towards Joseph, the foster father and Mary his mother. Jesus Christ chose to be born and grow up in the bosom of the holy family of Jesus and Mary (CCC#1655). Simeon and Anna, representing the faithful Israelites, waited patiently to see the salvation and deliverance of Israel and all the nations. Jesus' obedience to his mother and legal father fulfils the fourth commandment perfectly and was the temporal image of his filial obedience to his Father in heaven. The everyday obedience of Jesus to Joseph and Mary both announced and anticipated the obedience of Holy Thursday when Jesus said not my will, but your will be done (CCC#532).

The home of Nazareth is the school where we begin to understand the life of Jesus, thus, the school of the Gospel. The hidden life at Nazareth allows everyone to enter into fellowship with Jesus by the most ordinary events of daily life. The home of Nazareth is also the home of carpenter's Son, where we understand the lesson and proclaim the severe and redeeming law of human work (CCC#533). Simeon described the Holy Family as the salvation of the world after the Holy Spirit prompted him. In our own time, in a world often alien and even hostile to faith, believing families are of primary importance as centres of living, radiant faith. For this reason, the Second Vatican Council, using an ancient expression, calls the family the Ecclesia domestica, the domestic church. It is in the bosom of the family, that parents are by word and example becomes first heralds of the faith with regard to their children. They are to encourage their children in vocations which are proper to each child, fostering with special care any religious vocation (CCC#1656). Today, all families are invited to a life of faith and obedience. Like the family of Jesus, there will be surprises. There will be ups and downs and moments of contradiction, but there is hope in Christ. Like Simeon and Anna, Joseph and Mary put their faith in the Lord till they were rewarded with the sight of the new-born Saviour of the world

May esteem for silence, that admirable and indispensable condition of mind revive in families a desire and lesson. May Nazareth teach us what family life is, its communion of love, its austere and simple beauty, its sacred and inviolable character, and its lesson of work.

SOLEMNITY OF MARY MOTHER OF GOD

On 1 January we celebrate the liturgical feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which is the Octave of Christmas. The honouring of Mary as the Mother of God can be traced back to the Council of Ephesus in 431. By the seventh century, 1 January was observed as a celebration of the Maternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In the thirteenth century, the Feast of the Circumcision of Christ had come to replace the feast honouring Mary; however in 1751, after a push in Portugal for an official feast day celebrating Mary's divine maternity, Pope Benedict XIV allowed Portugal's churches to devote a feast to Mary on the first Sunday in May. Eventually, the feast extended to other countries and in 1914 began to be observed on 11 October. In 1931, Pope Pius XI extended the feast to the entire Church and in 1974 Pope Paul VI removed the feast of the Circumcision of Christ from the liturgical calendar and replaced it with the feast of the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, bringing Mary's feast day back to the first day of the year.

The feast is a celebration of Mary's motherhood of Jesus. The title Mother of God is a western derivation from the Greek Theotokos, which means God-bearer. Calling Mary Mother of God is the highest honour we can give to her. Just as Christmas honours Jesus as the Prince of Peace, the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God honours Mary as the Queen of Peace. New Year's Day is also designated as the World Day of Peace, further acknowledging the role of Mary in our hearts and in our world.
