PARISH CATECHESIS FROM FR JERRY

Theme: Look, there is the Lamb of God...

At the end of the Christmas season, John the Baptist baptised Jesus in the river Jordan to usher him into public ministry. The Gospel reading describes Jesus' public ministry and how John encountered Jesus and designated him as the Lamb of God. Why is Jesus Christ called the Lamb of God? By using this term to identify Christ, John the Baptist affirmed the redemptive sacrifice Christ would make for the salvation of all people. The lamb is an image associated with the Passover feast and Exodus event when God told the Israelites to sacrifice a spotless lamb and smear its blood on the doorposts of their houses to be spared from the tenth plague.

After agreeing to baptise Jesus along with the sinners, John the Baptist looked at Jesus and pointed him out as the 'Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world'. By doing so, he reveals that Jesus is at the same time the suffering servant who silently allows himself to be led to the slaughter and who bears the sin of the multitudes. Also, as the Lamb of God, Jesus represents Israel's redemption at the first Passover (CCC# 608).

The two disciples of John were attracted to follow Jesus. They went and saw where Jesus lived and stayed with him for the rest of the day. They encountered Jesus Christ and learned about his mission, which is to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many (Mk 10:45). After the personal encounter with Jesus Christ, one of the disciples, Andrew speaks to his brother about Jesus: 'We have found the Messiah, which means the Christ and he took Simon to Jesus'.

The action of the two disciples of John and Andrew specifically demonstrates the process of relationship or discipleship. The disciple needs courage to answer the call and follow Jesus Christ. The disciple must desire to 'come and see' and have a personal encounter with Jesus. We need a personal experience of the truth in Jesus Christ. The disciple must then go and bring others to 'come and see' and encounter Jesus Christ. Until we follow Jesus Christ and have a personal experience of him, we cannot share our convictions about Jesus with others. In fact, we cannot call ourselves true disciples of Jesus.

May our relationship with Jesus in the Eucharist purify our personal sins. Here I am, Lord! I come to do your will.

SAINT ANTHONY, ABBOT

Saint Anthony Abbot was an Egyptian hermit who lived in the 3rd century AD. Belonging to a wealthy Christian family, he soon remained only to administer the assets and possessions of the family and to provide for his younger sister. But Anthony chose to give everything he owned to the poor and needy and entrusted his sister to a religious congregation, he took the path of the desert and chose to live as a hermit. For this reason, he is also known as Saint Anthony of the Desert or Saint Anthony the Anchorite. In fact, at that time hermits were also called anchorites and lived in solitude, devoting every moment of their lives to prayer and meditation. Saint Anthony died at the age of 105, living until the end of his days as a hermit in the desert, growing a small vegetable garden and praying.

Saint Anthony is remembered among other things as the patron saint of pets. Every year, on the occasion of his feast, January 17, people bring to bless the pets and in the countryside even those of the stables. This tradition was born in medieval times, when the Antonians, the monks of Saint Anthony, raised pigs that were given to them by the farmers and used them to feed the poor, as well as to create medicated ointments with their fat combined with medicinal herbs.

Saint Anthony also had great thaumaturgical abilities that allowed him to heal many people suffering from terrible diseases, as well as free others from demonic possessions. The cult of the Saint and the thaumaturgic power of his relics has origins in France since the twelfth century.
