Through the power of the Holy Spirit we will be a parish renewed in our knowledge and understanding of the love of Jesus Christ, to enable each of us to fulfil our Christian mission.

PARISH CATECHESIS FROM FR JERRY

Theme: ... and with authority behind it he gives orders even to unclean spirit.

The Gospel reading speaks about the authority and power invested in Jesus Christ. While Jesus was teaching in the synagogue on a Sabbath day, he performed a miracle. This made a deep impression on the audience because, unlike the scribes, he teaches and acts with authority. Why does Jesus work many wonders and mighty works? The signs worked by Jesus attest that the Father has sent him. These mighty works and wonders invite belief in him. They are supposed to strengthen faith in the one who does his Father's works. These miracles are to bear witness that Jesus is the Son of God. However, his miracles can also be occasions for 'offence' because people might want to satisfy their emotional or sentimental curiosity. They are not intended to satisfy people's curiosity or desire for magic (CCC#548).

Jesus consciously accompanies his words with many 'mighty works and wonders and signs', which manifests that the kingdom is present in him and that he was the promised Messiah (CCC#547). The authority of Jesus Christ flows from the Father, the one who anoints him and the Holy Spirit, who is anointing. The coming of the kingdom is attested by the working of miracles by Jesus through the power of exorcism. This warfare between Jesus and Satan, between the kingdom of God and the kingdom of evil, is meant to strengthen our faith.

The Church teaches that the coming of God's kingdom means the defeat of Satan's kingdom (CCC#550). The evil spirit knows who Jesus is and already anticipates the imminent destruction of their kingdom of evil: 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God'. Jesus enjoins the evil spirit to be silent because the full revelation of the Holy One of God has not yet come. The people of Capernaum were so amazed by the power of God through the Good News.

At every liturgy of the Word, the church reminds us of the deep teachings of Sacred Scripture through the three readings and invites us to encounter a personal miracle in the liturgy of the Eucharist.

RACIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY

God of light and truth, you call all men and women to live lives of holiness and justice. Help us to see in one another: a heart which is tender, a mind which is humble and a care for our brothers and sisters; so that together we may build up the Body of Christ as a sign of hope and mercy for all. We make this prayer through Jesus our Lord. Amen.



ST JOHN BOSCO

John Melchior Bosco, popularly known as Don Bosco, was an Italian priest, educator, writer and saint of the 19th century. While working in Turin, where the population suffered many of the ill effects of industrialisation and urbanisation, he dedicated his life to the betterment and education of street children, juvenile delinquents and other disadvantaged youth. He developed teaching methods based on love rather than punishment, a method that became known as the Salesian Preventive System. A follower of the spirituality and philosophy of St Francis de Sales, Bosco was a devotee of the Virgin Mary under the title Mary Help of Christians. He later dedicated his works to de Sales when he founded the Salesians of Don Bosco, based in Turin. Together with Maria Domenica Mazzarello, he founded the Institute of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians, now commonly known as the Salesian Sisters of Don Bosco, a religious congregation of nuns dedicated to the care and education of poor girls. Fr Bosco died on 31 January 1888. Pope Pius XI declared him blessed in 1929. St John Bosco was canonised on Easter Sunday, 1934. He is the patron saint of apprentices, editors and publishers, schoolchildren, magicians and juvenile delinquents.
